Get a Bird's-Eye View

The continent's landscapes exude new beauty from above: A **private helicopter ride** reveals Africa's vast savannas, massive lakes, and towering mountains – feel the mist from thundering Victoria Falls as you hover overhead. Spot a Silverback


A small group trek through Volcanoes National Park in Rwanda brings travelers face-to-face with **mountain gorillas**. Once on the brink of extinction, these gentle giants have made a successful comeback, thanks to the combined conservation efforts of the Dian Fossey Gorilla Fund, the Rwandan government, and the country's citizens. This highly coveted activity is limited to uphold that protection: Only a dozen gorilla families live in the park, and no more than eight people may visit any given family each day.

Take to the Waters

Ditching the four-wheel drive for a different kind of wildlife-viewing adventure can provide a fresh and exciting perspective. Hop in a *mokoro* (a traditional canoe made from hollowed-out tree trunks or fiberglass) to spot hippos, crocodiles, and birds in Botswana's Okavango Delta or Chobe National Park. In South Africa, snap photos of penguins diving for their lunch during a kayak safari tour near Cape Town.

Run with Bloodhounds

Using more than 300 million scent receptors, a bloodhound's sense of smell is so accurate that its findings can be used in a U.S. court of law. In Kenya, these perceptive pups help protect endangered animals from the threat of poachers. Witness these skills in action on a Loisaba Conservancy visit with an anti-poaching unit or arrange a playful game of hide-and-seek with their handlers to see if you can escape the hounds' 95 percent seeker success rate.

This is the kind of time travel we believe in: Go to sleep in NYC; wake up in New Zealand two mornings later. It's now possible, as **Air New Zealand** debuts its new route between JFK and Auckland in September. The 17-hour long haul – the first nonstop flight to New Zealand from the U.S. East Coast – departs three times per week, coinciding nicely with the country's removal of some of its strict Covid travel restrictions earlier this year. We're more than ready for some Technicolor-green hills, black-sand beaches, and crisp sauvignon blanc. The jet lag? Nothing a little Middle-earth landscape can't cure. – *Amy Cassell*



Snack Attack


Proof that acclaimed meals aren't always served on white tablecloths: Asheville, North Carolina's Chai Pani, winner of this year's Outstanding Restaurant award from the James Beard Foundation. The colorful restaurant – its name, which means "tea and water," is a nod to the Indian tradition of snacking over tea – specializes in savory, street-food-style bites known as *chaat*. Expect plates of okra fries, chicken pakoras, and bhel puri (a crispy noodle and puffed rice dish with chutney) from chef Meherwan Irani, who immigrated to the U.S. from Maharashtra and opened Chai Pani more than a decade ago to showcase the underrepresented traditions and foods of his childhood.


- Stop into one of London's six Bao locations for pillowy-soft steamed buns, crispy noodle chips, and crowd-pleasing Taiwanese chicken wings.
- Clyde's Caribbean in Miami makes a mean Trinidadian bake sandwich: mahi-mahi, shrimp, chicken, or chickpeas in fried bread with house sauces.
- At San Diego's White Rice, chef Phillip Esteban pays homage to his Filipino childhood in garlic rice bowls called silog, topped with egg and one of many meat or veggie options.

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Trailing Vines

There's more to winetasting in Sonoma Valley than what's in your glass.

Sonoma County has made a name for itself as a wine region for nature lovers, with more than 1,500 square miles of wilderness and 50-plus miles of rugged coastline. We've rounded up winemakers who are leaning into the setting, pairing tastings with outdoor activities and tours that highlight their connection with the surroundings.

Just add wine: A tasting at Medlock Ames.

- Medlock Ames recently launched a self-guided audio tour that explores the sounds, sights, and organic farming practices across its 340-acre Bell Mountain Ranch outside Healdsburg, followed by a guided tasting of six current-release wines, paired with local organic cheeses.
- Wildflowers, redwoods, and vineyards greet visitors at **Bartholomew Estate Winery**, where three miles of dogfriendly trails, ranging from moderate to difficult, wind through the property's historic 375-acre park. For a more easygoing stroll, follow the paths through the vineyards and estate gardens.
- Near Sebastopol, Red Car Wine takes visitors on forestbathing excursions with a guided meditation walk through nearby redwood groves and vineyards before a tasting paired with cheeses.

- Kunde Family Winery's Dog Hike invites visitors and their pups to explore the sprawling 1,850-acre, sustainably farmed estate with fifth-generation winegrower Jordan Kunde. The four-hour trek over moderately hilly terrain begins October 8 call ahead for dates.
- Take a self-guided 1.2-mile walk through the Wild Oak Estate Vineyard at **St. Francis Winery & Vineyards** and sip wine made from the surrounding vines. Information at points along the way provides a grower's perspective on the winery's 100 percent sustainable production.
- Trails at **Montage Healdsburg** lead through the resort's 15 acres of vineyards and oak groves, and organic honey from its on-site apiary turns up in restaurant dishes and cocktails. *Doubles from* \$1,345, including breakfast daily and a \$100 resort credit. Katie Kelly Bell

Champagne Concierge

Lise Legrand helps guests at the **Royal Champagne Hotel & Spa** in Champillon, France, uncork the best of the Champagne region through hot-air ballooning above grand cru estates, exclusive tastings, and even proposals among the grapevines.

Best advice for first-time visitors:

Everyone knows Moët & Chandon and Dom Pérignon, but there's a lot to discover with small producers who really love their jobs. I recommend that guests visit two houses per day, since visits usually take about two hours.

Estimated Champagne makers in the region: A lot! We have 16,000 growers and 320 houses.

Faux pas to avoid: Don't wear perfume for tastings at Champagne houses, and never take a sip before everyone is served – or before toasting (santé!).

Besides Champagne, make sure to try: Reims' pink biscuits, called biscuits roses. My grandparents used to dip them in their Champagne.

Favorite day-off activity: Walking in the vineyards. They aren't private – you can walk through them, just like a forest.

Fun fact about harvest season:

Trucks are full of grapes, and the roads get very sticky with grape juice.

If not Champagne, what's in your glass? I love ratafia, a sweet liqueur made with Champagne grapes. Be careful: More than one can give you a hangover.

... which in French is: Gueule de bois, which translates roughly to "wooden mouth."

What's this about an in-room "Champagne Please!" call button? Press it at any hour, and within minutes a server will be at your door with three cuvées for you to choose from.

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

World Cup of Culture

Doha seems bent on making sure spectators have plenty to admire, on and off the pitch, during the FIFA World Cup Qatar, which kicks off in November. The new **3-2-1 Qatar Olympic and Sports Museum** features interactive exhibits on the history of sports dating back to the eighth century BC, the growth of the Olympic Games, and 90 global stars and traditional Qatari sports – including falconry, pearl diving, and camel racing. The 204,000-square-foot space is built into the side of Khalifa International Stadium, a host site for matches, and includes a restaurant from UK-based, Michelinstarred chef Tom Aikens. Elsewhere across Qatar's capital city, more than 40 major works from celebrated artists such as Katharina Fritsch and Olafur Eliasson are being installed at the airport and in parks, shopping centers, and railway stations. Doha is already one of the Middle East's biggest cultural hubs, home to public sculptures by Richard Serra and Louise Bourgeois and the landmark Jean Nouvel-designed National Museum of Qatar. – *E.G.*



But wait, there's more: The Katara Towers in the Lusail district – designed to look like Qatar's national seal – are home to the new 132-room Raffles Doha and the 362-room Fairmont Doha.

Crowning Achievement

Milliner Gigi Burris O'Hara – who crafts her distinctly modern hats using a centuries-old technique she learned while studying fashion in Paris – shares her foolproof method for how to pack a hat.



1

Roll clothing and place it around the inside perimeter of a hard-sided suit-case. Once you've packed around the sides, start to fill clothing inward, leaving a doughnut-shaped hole in the center of the suitcase.

2

Fill the hole with your hat, crown side down.

3.

Place soft items such as bathing suits, pajamas, and T-shirts inside the hat's crown to hold its shape. 4


Place items that can't be rolled (dresses, tailored jackets, etc.) flat on top of the filled-doughnut packing layer. This top layer keeps your hat from moving around in transit.

5.

Pack heavy items, such as toiletry kits, toward the bottom (wheel end) of the suitcase to avoid crushing your hat. 6.

If you're traveling without a hard suitcase, simply wear your hat on the plane. It will start your trip off on a festive note.




OKINAWA GETTING THERE

Getting there is an easy hop from Tokyo or Osaka. Both Japan Airlines and ANA offer many inexpensive daily flights.

STUNNING NATURAL BEAUTY

Swaths of pristine sand, glass-like surf, and colorful marine life make Okinawa's breathtaking beaches ideal for whiling away your days. Many of the best beaches are a quick flight or ferry ride from the main island of Okinawa, such as Futamigaura Beach, featuring a painted blue seascape crowned by panoramic mountain vistas, and Kabira Bay on Ishigaki Island, bordered by tropical rainforests. Sea life thrives here as well. Thanks to warm crystal waters, diverse sea life, and some 200 different coral species, Okinawa is one of the best diving destinations in the world. Uncover nature at its best when you visit Iriomote Island. Nearly shrouded entirely in jungle, this outdoor lover's paradise is the last unexplored region of Japan, and home to unique animals like the Iriomote wild cat. Here you can experience nature's bounty by jungle trekking or canoing through one of Japan's largest mangrove forests.



LOCAL CUISINE

With its amalgamation of Ryukyu, Chinese, Japanese, Southeast Asian, and American cultures, Okinawa's cuisine is a diverse melting pot that vastly differs from mainland Japan. Okinawan people are said to have one of the longest life expectancies in the world, and in particular, because of their diet. Traditional dishes include Goya Chanpuru, a stir-fry made with goya, a bitter vitamin C and fiber-rich melon known for its rejuvenating properties. Once only served to royalty, Rafute is a local pork dish simmered in Awamori, an Okinawan liquor, along with brown sugar and soy sauce. The liquor makes the meat so tender it can be sliced with chopsticks. For dessert, Okinawan raw sugar, a mineral-infused brown sugar with a rich molasses flavor, is eaten like candy.



Rain-Forest Finds

Natural wonders never cease in Ecuador's Mashpi Rainforest Biodiversity Reserve, home to the 24-room **Mashpi Lodge**. Since the lodge-cum-research lab's 2012 opening, resident naturalists have discovered ten species new to science, including their latest find, the translucent, two-centimeter-long Mashpi glass frog. Other coups range from newly discovered orchid and magnolia species to two edible varieties of mushrooms that have made their way into dishes at the lodge's restaurant. "Our ultimate hope with the mushrooms is to train locals how to sustainably cultivate them in greenhouses," says Mashpi's research and biology director, Mateo Roldán. 

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



It is the original seat of power of Saudi Arabia's Al Saud family and contains the ruins of mud-brick houses connected by narrow alleyways, as well as numerous museums and other intriguing spaces.

Located about a 90-minute drive outside Riyadh, Jebel Fihrayn (known as "The Edge of the World") forms part of the vast Tuwaiq Escarpment which stretches more than 600 kilometers through central Saudi. Arrived at by traversing winding desert trails that run along a Tuwaiq ridge, this spectacular spot offers uninterrupted views across the valley floor and to the horizon.

ON TOP OF THE WORLD

Cruise through the Arctic and to the North Pole in eco-friendly style on Ponant's luxe new icebreaker.

ONANT'S NEWEST SHIP, *Le Commandant Charcot*, takes its name from French explorer and polar scientist Jean-Baptiste Charcot – fitting, given the vessel's ambitious itineraries and sustainable pedigree. The 245-passenger expedition ship splits its time between the Arctic and Antarctica, whisking travelers to some of the most hard-to-reach corners of the globe.

Northern Exposure

Le Commandant Charcot spends every spring and summer in the Arctic, bouncing between 15- to 17-night trips through the **Arctic Circle** and 10- to 18-night jaunts around Greenland, Norway, Canada, and Iceland. Travelers fly into Longyearbyen, the capital of Norway's Svalbard archipelago (roughly 650 miles north of mainland Scandinavia), before setting out to carve through Arctic ice floes on the way to Earth's northern axis. The ship's ice-breaking capabilities give cruisers access to areas many other vessels can't reach, such as Greenland's remote northeastern shores, inhabited by Inuit communities.

Comfort with a Conscience

There's no roughing it on board: Interior windows, a glass-paneled rear bridge, and a shipwide promenade deck keep passengers' eyes focused squarely on the natural surroundings. The Veuve Clicquot flows freely at the Inneq (Inuit for "fire") terrace bar and in the fine-dining Nuna (meaning "earth") restaurant by Alain Ducasse, while an onboard pastry chef creates desserts rivaling any Parisian patisserie – this is a French ship, after all. In another luxury cruising first, Le Commandant Charcot's hybrid-electric combo of battery power and liquified natural gas keeps the air cleaner and the ship's movements quieter for aquatic life. Recycled energy from the ship's propulsion heats outdoor benches, and eco-friendly alternatives have replaced single-use plastics throughout.

Super-Cool Excursions

You won't get these experiences at lower latitudes: Mush with Indigenous residents on dogsleds in Greenland, don a dry suit for the ultimate **Arctic polar plunge**, and learn to fish off an ice floe with a naturalist's guidance. Spend some quiet time on deck looking for whales amid glacier-dominated landscapes; for more adventure, zip across icy waters in a Zodiac to go snowshoeing ashore. Passengers can visit *Le Commandant Charcot*'s research laboratories to assist with glaciology, oceanography, marine biology, climatology, and social sciences projects, helping protect these delicate regions for future travelers.

MONTSERRAT

The local tourist board once advertised bucolic Montserrat as "the way the Caribbean used to be," celebrating a quiet lifestyle that lured expats to build villas and The Police and Paul McCartney, among others, to record here. In 1995, the long-dormant Soufrière Hills volcano rumbled awake, burying the former capital and rendering the southern half of the island uninhabitable for years to come. Cruisers can explore this modern-day Pompeii on guided

tours from **Windstar Cruises**' newly refurbished and expanded 312-passenger *Star Pride*, which visits the Volcano Isle on a seven-night voyage round-trip from San Juan. *Departures: Multiple dates, November 19, 2022, through March 11, 2023; from \$3,199.*

VIRGIN GORDA

The British Virgin Islands represent the archetypal Caribbean archipelago, with 50-plus isles that offer unparalleled yachting. With just 4,000 residents,

Virgin Gorda has the chain's trademark white-sand coves and snorkeling, plus an iconic scene-stealer: The Baths, a jumble of giant boulders lumped along the sand. Follow the vague path leading between them to a heavenly cove called, ironically, Devil's Bay. **Star Clippers**' classic four-masted sailing ship, the 166-passenger *Star Flyer*, calls on Virgin Gorda during a seven-night sailing round-trip from Sint-Maarten. *Departures: Multiple dates, December 3, 2022, through March 11, 2023; from \$2,360.*



BEQUIA

The largest of the Grenadines unfurls off the end of Saint Vincent like the tassel

on a kite and delivers a potent shot of charisma. Bequia (pronounced beckwee) stretches just seven square miles, but it packs in the best of this idyllic island chain. Take in the turtle sanctuary at Old Hegg, or simply find your way to one of several resplendent beaches. Two recommendations: Hire a dinghy or hike about a mile to reach Princess Margaret Beach, named for the royal visitor, or taxi to Lower Bay Beach, guarded by a friendly cat named Laptop. Explore Bequia on a ten-night cruise round-trip from Barbados aboard Silversea's new 596-passenger Silver Dawn. Departures: February 8 and March 13, 2023; from \$5,600.

• TERRE-DE-HAUT, LES SAINTES

The diminutive Îles des Saintes are an eight-blip cluster of lanky French beauties lolling off Guadeloupe's southern coast. Most are uninhabited, but Terrede-Haut – laced with protected coves and riven by motorbikes buzzing in and out of the port – comes alive each morning with the arrival of the ferry from Guadeloupe. Boutiques, cafés, and gingerbread-style houses surround the dock, while women sell tourment d'amour, delicious salty-sweet coconut tarts that will fortify you on a hike to Fort Napoléon, looming on the bluff above. Terre-de-Haut is reminiscent of Saint Bart's before Rothschild and Rockefeller arrived; SeaDream Yacht Club's 112-passenger SeaDream I calls here on a seven-night voyage from Saint-Martin to Barbados. Departure: February 26, 2023: from \$3.999.

TOBAGO

Trinidad and Tobago is a nation of contrasts: Oil-rich Trinidad is famed for its raucous Carnival; Tobago provides a languid landing where Trinis go to unwind amid the Western Hemisphere's oldest forest reserve, which shelters a range of exotic birds, including the bluecrowned motmot and collared trogon. Tawny sand fringes indolent coves such as Pirate's Bay and Englishman's Bay, but allow time to seek out breadfruit pie and tania fritters at Jemma's Tree House restaurant in Speyside, or the crab and dumpling at Miss Trim's in Store Bay. During its maiden Caribbean season. The Ritz-Carlton Yacht Collection's 298-passenger Evrima will call at Tobago during a seven-night sailing, round-trip from Barbados. Departure: March 19, 2023; from \$6,100.

ALL IN ON ANGUILLA

This tiny Caribbean island goes big on fun.

URE, YOU COULD DRIVE AROUND ANGUILLA IN ABOUT 45 MINUTES, but you're going to want way more time to explore. This British overseas territory in the Lesser Antilles packs 33 white-sand beaches into just 35 square miles. Whether you're ready to tie the knot or treat your taste buds, here's what we love about Anguilla.

Bring the Whole Squad

Anguilla caters to family flings with both high-energy and laid-back diversions for all ages. Take the kids on a glass-bottom boat ride to spot sea turtles in Shoal Bay. Older teens and adults can pump up the adrenaline off-roading through Forest Bay's lush oceanside greenery. The island knows how to throw a party, with annual events ranging from a lively, **family-friendly boat race** (Anguilla's national sport) in August to the more adult-oriented atmosphere at the Moonsplash reggae music festival in March, hosted by artist and island legend Bankie Banx at his Dune Preserve indoor-outdoor venue.

Get Swept Away

Sunsets are on display nearly every day, and the island's topography limits rainfall to a few short bursts throughout the year, making Anguilla a popular spot for **destination weddings**. Six Virtuoso resorts on the island offer wedding and honeymoon options that include everything from couple's massages and live guitarists to catered seaside dinners under twinkling lights. Couples looking for more nontraditional nuptials may consider exchanging vows on a sailboat beneath the stars.

Anguilla's secluded private villas, which can come staffed with chefs and butlers, also draw honeymooners to their infinity-edge pools and open-air courtyards with waterfront views. Unwind after the big day with horseback rides on the beach and private spa packages that include Javanese body scrubs and sun-soothing aloe vera wraps.

Pack Your Appetite

Get your fill of conch fritters and the Anguillan national dish – herb-seasoned red snapper with pigeon peas and rice – at chic beachfront restaurants and roadside outposts across the island. Head to Ocean Echo Restaurant on the north coast's Meads Bay for seaside breezes and the island's freshest yellowfin tuna. Grab an umbrella-shaded picnic bench at the SunShine Shack (known locally as "Garvey's") for barbecued chicken legs with Garvey's secret sauce or **grilled lobster** doused in butter and Caribbean Creole seasoning. And on Saturdays, hit The Valley – Anguilla's capital – where Mabel Gumbs' food stand and her corn soup, made with pig tails and salted beef, draw a loyal crowd.

The Luau Gets Real


The hula- and mai tai-packed luau of days past has evolved. Case in point: The Feast at Mokapu, the new luau at the 321room Andaz Maui at Wailea **Resort**, which tells the story of the ahupua'a (land division), resilience, and restoration of the Hawaiian Islands, including Kaho'olawe, a sacred island that was returned to the Hawaiian people following its use as a bomb practice site during and after World War II. (Guests can see Kaho'olawe from the resort's oceanfront lawn, where the luau is held.) "We've got many great luaus in Hawaii, but authenticity hasn't been the tradition," says Andaz Hawaiian culture training specialist Kalikolehua Storer. "Now that we're more educated about our history, it should be reflected in our luaus." Here, Storer's advice for seeking out a luau with more culture and less cheese.

- 1. Reframe your expectations. "Do you want fire dances and drums?" Storer asks. "That's OK, but there are luaus that will be bold and ask you to think in other aloha ways."
- 2. Look for a luau that "talks story," with plenty of storytelling. This practice of conversation among family and friends is at the heart of Hawaiian tradition. Guests should learn something personal, new, and unexpected from the stories presented.
- 3. Choose a luau that showcases the local history of the island you're visiting. "Luaus should accurately and respectfully represent the people and their place," says Storer.

The *Nautica* is fresh off a spate of updates, including **refreshed suites**, staterooms, and public spaces. *Departure: December 8, 2023; from \$8,399.*

Three Weeks, Three Seas

Tiptoe into grand voyage territory late next year on a 19-night, Istanbulto-Dubai cruise through the Mediterranean, Red, and Arabian seas aboard the recently refurbished, 1,238-passenger *Riviera*. Take a **chef-led tour** through Istanbul's spice and fish markets, kayak off the coast of Rhodes in the Greek isles, and sip wine made with grapes resurrected from ancient varieties in Cyprus. Up for some action? Go spelunking in Oman's Al-Hoota Cave or horseback riding through a red sandstone canyon in Petra, Jordan. *Departure: November 29, 2023; from \$4,699.*

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



He loves Beirut and spent two formative weeks hiking in Ladakh, India. "Traveling – and living and working abroad – has completely shaped me and, as a result, my business," he says. "I'd like to think I've developed a real love for humanity, a sensitivity to people around the world, and an understanding that diversity is strength."



After I graduated from college, I moved to Istanbul to work for Microsoft. What was supposed to be a six-month stint turned into two years of expat life, followed by ten years of Sabah and a deep appreciation for Turkey's craftsmanship, culture, and people. My spoken Turkish is pretty

good. I'd like to think I'm an honorary Turk, but you'd have to ask them!

I could probably write a short book on eating and drinking in Istanbul. Some highlights: **Karakoy Lokantasi** is my favorite restaurant in the city. I think it's best for lunch. They have an eggplant dish, hunkar begendi (Sultan's delight) – wow! For a real experience, take a sea taxi across the Bosporus to **Suna'nin Yeri**, a local fish, mezze, and raki spot right on the ferry dock in Kandilli, on Istanbul's Asian side. There are few more magical experiences than pulling up to the dock in









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

the early evening, jumping out, and enjoying a simple but delicious meal at sunset on the Bosporus.


My favorite Istanbul neighborhood that isn't on the obvious trail: **Arnavutkoy**, a historic seaside community a bit farther up the Bosporus. Wander through its hills, between historic wooden homes and streets lined with restaurants, cafés, and shops. On a Saturday or Sunday afternoon, it makes for excellent peoplewatching. Finish your visit with a meal at one of the many fish restaurants. My favorite is **Arnavutkoy Balikcisi** – great food, great vibe. If you've got the energy, after dinner, walk to the Bebek neighborhood for a drink at **Lucca**.

Farther afield, you can't overlook Turkey's beaches - rent a car in Antalya and drive west along the Mediterranean coast. At the point where the Aegean Sea meets the Mediterranean, the coastline gets really interesting at incredible little beach towns such as Datca, Bozburun, and Selimiye. Turning north up the coast, it's one great beach town after another until you reach Ayvalik (roughly two hours beyond Izmir), which is lovely. I'd skip the Bodrums and Cesmes and focus on these smaller towns. The Turkish coast is so easy and safe to navigate by car, with incredible, welcoming people - it's the kind of place you can really explore. 9


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Greece: City Scenes or Island Life?

Kick off an eight-day itinerary in Greece with an in-depth tour of Athens' antiquities and ruins, or swap the city crowds for more relaxed seaside vibes on Cape Sounion at the mainland's southernmost tip. There, you can watch the sunset at the Temple of Poseidon, a monument to the god of the sea. Sample Greek wines at one of Athens' coolest bars or hop over to Aegina (roughly an hour by ferry from the city) to admire the beautifully intact **Temple of Aphaia** and walk along the island's lively seaside promenade. Before heading back to Athens, stop into a taverna for a shot of ouzo and a handful of pistachios, the island's signature snack.

Northern California: Saloons or Summits?


A nine-day Northern California adventure includes time at Mammoth Lakes in the Sierra Nevada, where activities cater to history and nature lovers. Hear colorful stories about infamous characters as you walk through the saloon, jailhouse, and other frozen-in-time buildings in Bodie, a former **gold-mining town** turned state park. Prefer more fresh air? Reach Mammoth Mountain's 11,053-foot summit via gondola before hiking across its wildflower-filled alpine terrain. At sea level, naturalists lead kayak tours on million-year-old Mono Lake (one of North America's oldest bodies of water). The tufa limestone formations jutting from the water resemble lunar landscapes.


Italy: Leisurely Rides or Tuscan Feasts?

An eight-day tour through Umbria and Tuscany reveals the many delicious layers of northern Italy. Pedal through cobblestoned alleys and piazzas on a small-group bike tour of Florence, or prepare a four-course Tuscan feast under a local chef's guidance (complete with a crash course in making pasta from scratch). Visit the Duomo, Ponte Vecchio, and Uffizi Gallery with an expert guide, who will lead you to a **secret Michelangelo carving**. You'll work up an appetite after all that walking: Don't leave the city without a taste of its signature dishes, including bistecca alla Fiorentina (Florentine steak) or a hearty bowl of *ribollita* (Tuscan bread and vegetable soup).



ROM LITTLE INDIA'S colorful Hindu shrines to the Arab Quarter's onion-domed mosques, Sentosa's palm-studded beaches, and its lush jungle hinterland, Singapore seems to cram the gamut of Asia's natural and cultural highlights into a country smaller than New York City. During the pandemic, this city-state boosted its eco-cred, wrapping up rewilding projects such as the cross-country Rail Corridor trail and the ABC Waters floating wetlands at Jurong Lake, providing even more reasons to lace up the hiking boots. At the same time, the formerly gritty suburb of Joo Chiat saw third-wave coffee shops and rootsy boutiques such as Common Man Coffee Roasters and Crane breathe new life into the area's Peranakan heritage homes.


EAT After turning his fine-dining French restaurant Odette into a three-Michelinstarred hit, chef Julien Royer took his latest opening, **Claudine**, in a more casual direction. Housed in a 1930s chapel in Dempsey Hill, the restaurant focuses on Royer's heirloom family recipes designed for sharing, such as a spot-on

Named after the California hometown of chef David Tang, Central Business District hot spot **Rosemead** redefines what it means to eat locally in a dining scene more often associated with airlifted produce. Tang works closely with regional farmers for seasonal menus that range from local fish prepared on the open kitchen's lychee-wood grill to flower-flecked plates of mangrove crab tartines and deceptively simple salads with aquaponically grown vegetables.

Equal parts vinyl listening bar, gallery, and food lab, Chinatown's **Appetite** delivers a deep dive into cross-cultural art and cuisine. From behind the U-shaped kitchen counter, chef Ivan Brehm and his team dish out an *omakase* menu that could include everything from Spanish shrimp fritters to sourdough

with Sichuan-pepper-speckled stracciatella cheese.

DRINK Sustainability is key at **Analogue**, a plant-based restaurant and cocktail spot with a bar counter 3D-printed from 3,500 pounds of recycled plastic. Similarly, the drink menu features ingredients with minimal eco-impact, such as vegan honey, blue spirulina, and carob powder instead of resource-heavy cacao.

Moodily lit **Live Twice** pays tribute to midcentury modern Japan. The drinks, mixed by a sharp-suited bar team, are crisp and frill-free, with riffs on Japanese classics such as *mizuwari* highballs with a house blend of whiskies, or creative interpretations such as Roku gin paired with orange riesling and high-mountain tea.

SHOP Dandy gentlemen and women from around Asia flock to Joo Chiat mainstay **Hat of Cain** for custom-fitted

Panama hats woven in Ecuador. At this homey headwear salon, mustachioed owner and longtime Canadian expat Bill Cain advises his clients on everything from brim widths to weaving styles and can customize headbands and feather details.

An unassuming industrial building near Jalan Besar is the surprising setting of **The General Co**, which specializes in artisanal pieces such as made-to-order wallets, luggage tags, and hand-painted leather goods. On the ground floor, woodworking design studio **Roger&Sons** stocks modern cutting boards and coasters.

Hit up the sleek store-café of homegrown fashion label **In Good Company** in the basement of ION Orchard for tactile accessories and men's- and womenswear in bold monochromes and modish silhouettes. STAY Raffles Singapore might have opened more than a century ago, but a 2019 makeover gave the icon a fresh new look. While its polished teakwood floors and silver cutlery remain, licks of orange and purple in the 115 suites and new restaurants by Alain Ducasse and Anne-Sophie Pic fit right in with the Singapore of today. Doubles from \$1,000, including breakfast daily and a \$100 hotel credit.

Behind the honeycomb facade of a gleaming high-rise at the crossroads of Kampong Glam, Little India, and Bras Basah. Bugis, **Andaz Singapore**'s 342 rooms feature big-city views and summery interiors by Hong Kong design hotshot André Fu. The tepee-dotted rooftop hangout, Mr. Stork, is a brilliant spot for sundowners. *Doubles from* \$350, including breakfast daily and a \$100 dining credit. •

LMOST ALL COFFEE beans come from the same three parts of the world – Latin America, Africa, and Southeast Asia – while "coffee culture" stems from elsewhere: Italian espressos popularized by megachains, for example, and a tsunami of third-wave shops embracing the crisp modern aesthetics of Scandinavian cafés. The world's coffee-growing regions have largely been ignored by the industry, despite having their own flavors and traditions worth savoring.

But in Portland – a Pacific Northwest hub of culinary creativity – immigrants and first-generation Americans are thoughtfully (and deliciously) connecting beans to the places they came from. Mexican beans accompany savory empanadas, Chinese coffee powers gorgeous red-date lattes, and Vietnamese *ca phe sua* is made with beans from the same country. By importing decor, service, and drink styles, along with the coffee itself, these five cafés brew up exciting flavors rarely found in the U.S. – fitting in a city known for its progressive thinking.

The Source: Mexico ESPERANZA TRADING CO.

This plant-filled shop that opened in February is run by the hospitality group behind República, one of Portland's most popular restaurants. Esperanza serves beans from Mexico and



elsewhere, roasted and ground to create an array of coffee drinks, including *cafecito*, *cortadito*, and *café de olla*, a spiced coffee made with cinnamon and *piloncillo* (raw dark sugar). Equally as delicious: the *pan dulce*, rainbow-sprinkle *conchas* (sweet buns), mango empanadas, and *escabeche* cream-cheese rolls made by executive pastry chef Olivia Bartruff and her team.

The Source: China SUPER JOY COFFEE

The country built by tea also grows coffee: China ramped up its coffee production about a decade ago, and Super Joy's stars are beans from Yunnan Province, roasted by co-owner Joe Yang. Yang, a former La Marzocco salesperson in China and a current Q grader (like a sommelier for coffee), puts quality and flavor first, but the deep red (a lucky color in China) bags of beans hint at Super Joy's other goal: to incorporate

Chinese culture into the café. Customers can taste the result of that mission on the streamlined drink menu, which includes espresso drinks made with Chinese peppers, sweet ginger, and caramel soy sauce.

The Source: Vietnam PORTLAND CÀ PHÊ

Deemed as too dark and bitter, Vietnamese robusta coffee beans have long had a bad rap among consumers, taking a back seat to the arabica variety. But robusta's higher caffeine levels and lower sugar content work well in the drinks often served in Vietnam, such as *ca phe sua*, traditionally brewed in a small metal filter called a *phin*, often dripping directly into condensed milk. Founder Kim Dam began roasting Vietnamese beans during the pandemic and ended up turning her hobby into a business. With the intention of changing the reputation of Vietnamese beans,

she started creating roasts for her family's banh mi shop, then selling beans online. Last year, she added a small café to her roastery in Southeast Portland, where she serves drinks made using a blend of Vietnam-grown arabica and robusta beans, as well as a small menu of Vietnamese sandwiches, including the house-special pork banh mi.

The Source: Guatemala CAFÉ ZAMORA

At Café Zamora, marimba music plays in the background as patrons sip pourovers beneath a Guatemalan flag that hangs from the ceiling. The Southeast Portland shop, opened in 2019, was the realization of a decades-long dream for Héctor Mejía Zamora, who grew up in Santa Rosa, Guatemala, working on his father's coffee farm. Though his dad died when he was 14, Zamora continued pursuing his father's goal to sell high-quality Guatemalan coffee directly to the consumer – Café Zamora brews the



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

family farm's beans. The café's second location, an outpost in downtown's popular Portland Food Hall, opened earlier this year. Swing in for iced brews or to pick up a bag of beans to bring home.

The Source: Brazil NOSSA FAMILIA COFFEE

Augusto Carneiro's family has grown coffee in Brazil since the nineteenth century, and while his family's farms no longer supply all the coffee to his Portland roastery, guests at Nossa Familia's three locations can still taste that legacy in many of the company's "Family Line" roasts, along with farm-direct beans from Latin America. But the Brazilian flavor at Nossa goes beyond the beans – the espresso bar serves the classic *cafezinho* (espresso, hot water, and raw sugar) on its menu of "Nossa Signatures," along with the ideal accompaniment: fresh Brazilian cheese waffles, its twist on the classic *pão de queijo*.




Wake Up and Smell the Coffee

STAY Downtown Portland's 331-room The Nines occupies the top nine floors of the former Meier & Frank department store building, capped with a rooftop restaurant and bar laying claim to some of the city's best views. Modern guest rooms channel high-fashion ateliers with brocade wallpaper and jewel-tone-blue furniture, and the 400-plus-piece art collection (curated by a former confidante of Andy Warhol) includes sculptural mannequins in the lobby that nod to the hotel's sartorial past. Doubles from \$246, including breakfast daily and a \$100 dining credit.

GO On an eight-day group tour from Seattle to San Francisco, **Collette** introduces travelers to the West Coast's natural and culinary bounty, from Pike Place Market to the Golden Gate Bridge and Fisherman's Wharf. Two nights in Portland (complete with a field trip to Multnomah Falls) provide ample time to caffeinate before cutting through Oregon's Willamette Valley (famous for its pinot noir) on the way to the Pacific Northwest coast. *Departures: Multiple dates, September 5, 2022, through April 28, 2024; from \$2,339.*

Intrepid Travel packs four national park and monument stops (Olympic, Mount Rainier, Crater Lake, and Muir Woods) into its 11-day, Seattle-to-San Francisco group tour, but punctuates the outdoor immersion with some urban adventure too. In Seattle, travelers sip ales at a zero-waste brewery, while the highlight of a full day in Portland is a culinary-themed bike tour to some of the city's best food carts. 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

Howth Harbour's restaurant row.

IRDS CIRCLED and hovered over the sea stack, a square-shaped outcrop just off the island of Ireland's Eye. As our group approached on a small ferry, we could hear the screeches of hundreds of gannets, stationed on every crag of the rock.

Less than a mile from the fishing port of Howth on Dublin's north coast, this tiny, uninhabited isle is home to thousands of seabirds, as well as seals, who lounge on seaweed-covered rocks at low tide as if guarding the shore. Brown-and-white guillemots bobbed up and down on the steel-gray sea, disappearing under the water as we approached, while black cormorants perched on rocks to spread their wings to dry.

Many people don't realize Dublin is a coastal city, but with the new Dublin Coastal Trail, it's easy to explore the seashore that's right on

its doorstep. In less than 30 minutes from Dublin Castle by rail or road, you can be worlds away from the capital's buzz and pub crawls, visiting small islands by ferry, sailboat, or sea kayak; strolling beaches; or exploring cliffs, piers, lighthouses, and historic round towers. As someone who has lived on Dublin Bay for years and gotten to know its coves and coastline by paddleboard, tall ship, hiking boot, and more, it's exciting to see travelers discover it.

"The bay is where true Dubliners learned to sail and fish," says Virtuoso travel agency owner and Dublin native Siobhan Byrne Learat. "It's where you snuck out for your first date and kiss."

Officially, the trail runs roughly 68 miles from the fishing port of Skerries in the north to posh Killiney in

the south. The northern stretch winds among sandy beaches and dunes that lead to villages such as Malahide, with its castle, pubs, and cafés, and Howth, a town of harborfront seafood restaurants that's steeped in thousands of years of history and folklore.

To the south, the harbor town of Dún Laoghaire and its two long piers are primed for leisurely weekend outings, with guided motorboat and sailing tours, paddleboard rentals, and four yacht clubs filling the bay with watercraft of all sizes. Hardy locals take to the sea for brisk morning swims yearround in Sandycove. Around the point at Dalkey's Bulloch Harbour, kayaking guides lead paddles along the rocky coastline among porpoises and arctic terns to Lamb Island's seal colony.

"On weekends, Dalkey has always been the posh place to visit," Learat says of the village Bono now calls home and where Matt Damon holed up with his family during the pandemic lockdown. "Its feels like you're in the heart of a French fishing village, with foodie spots and cozy pubs to chat in for hours with friends." Plan to play it loose with the schedule, though: "Lunches have a way of turning into relaxed, boozy evenings," she says. "Dalkey does that to you."

As our ferry rounded the back of Ireland's Eye, I still hadn't spotted the one bird that had lured me out on the bay: the elusive puffin, with its multicolored beak, which migrates here in March to breed and raise its young through the summer. Then, as if on cue, a single puffin appeared, floating on the sea with his guillemot cousins. Moments later, another one perched on the rocks. It was proof that even for someone who lives on the bay, Dublin's coast has many more jewels to reveal.


Where to Stay in Dublin

Encompassing four restored Georgian town houses with eighteenth-century marble fire-places and period furniture throughout, the 142-room **Merrion** presides across from the Edwardian Government Buildings, just a few minutes' walk from the National Gallery of Ireland and Irish Museum of Modern Art. Its two-Michelin-starred Restaurant Patrick Guilbaud has been one of the city's top tables for decades. *Doubles from \$490, including breakfast daily and one lunch or dinner for two.*

The 265-room **Shelbourne** dates to 1824 and has the grand reception rooms, chandeliers, soaring ceilings, portraits, and prime position across from Saint Stephen's Green to show for it. Drop by the snug 1824 Bar for a whiskey from one of the city's best collections. Doubles from \$590, including breakfast daily and one lunch or dinner for two.

Set in the heart of Grafton Street's buzzing shopping, cafés, and nightlife, the 205-room **Westbury** is a stylish sanctuary. Its art deco-themed Gallery and Sidecar bar are popular with locals for afternoon tea and pre- or post-theater cocktails. *Doubles from* \$442, including breakfast daily and one lunch or dinner for two. **Q**







In Port



ALVADOR IS a destination deeply rooted in its African heritage - a vibrant city where the culture of enslaved Africans brought here to build it lives on in the food and religion, the dance, and the music that pulsates at all hours of the day and night. Sitting at the tip of a peninsula separating All Saints' Bay from the Atlantic Ocean, Bahia's capital is unadorned in its beauty yet sultry in its vibe. Founded in 1549 by the Portuguese, this northeastern Brazilian city woos travelers with baroque colonial-style churches, historic monuments, and a Carnaval celebration that's revered as one of the world's largest and most exciting. Whether visitors explore the Cidade Baixa (lower city) or the Cidade Alta (upper city), they're surrounded by sparkling sun and beautiful beaches, bright colors worn with flair by residents (and by century-old houses), and parties that break out routinely in the winding cobblestoned streets and squares. No wonder cruise ships large and small call upon the historic port. Here's how to spend a day in the city.

Not far from the cruise ship terminal and set in a restored customs building, **Mercado Modelo** is now home to some 250 stalls where Afro-Brazilian artists and craftspeople showcase their work. Head across the street to **Elevador Lacerda**, an art deco elevator that connects

the lower city to the UNESCO-listed upper city of **Pelourinho**. The first site at the top: **Rio Branco Palace**, the state government's former headquarters, which dates to 1549.

10 ...

Wander Pelourinho's streets, following its candy-hued colonial architecture and gold-laden churches to the historic square and, from a darker chapter of the city's history, a pillory. Nearby, **Igreja e Convento de São Francisco** is perhaps the most impressive baroque church in all of Brazil. A massive silver chandelier hangs from the ornately carved vaulted ceilings above azulejos and jacarandawood pews. A few steps away, boutique



Pau Brasilis specializes in locally made crafts, jewelry, woven baskets, and home decor.

12 PM

Stroll the popular Santo Antônio Além do Carmo neighborhood's Rua do Carmo – a street that's home to artists, writers, and expats to Cafélier, a café where vintage marble tables, brass wall sconces, velvet sofas, and black-and-white photos of Salvador's famous artists and writers set the scene. Out back, a lovely bougain villea-shaded terrace overlooks the bay. After a café com leite, continue down the street and pop into its nondescript ateliers, where you might spot artisans working on ceramics, wood, or plaster carvings for the city's churches. You won't see much in the way of signage (or even addresses), but don't let that keep you from stopping in to say hello while they work.

2 PM

Taxi to Blue Praia Bar, perched on a cliff above a private cove on Buracão Beach in the lively Rio Vermelho neighborhood. Choose from Balinese-style daybeds for lounging in the sun or tables at the beach bar, where you can sit with your toes in the sand sipping caipirinhas made



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with the house cachaça. Pair cocktails with codfish croquettes or the Afro-Bahian *arroz de hauçá*, a favored rice dish made with dried meat, shrimp, and coconut milk.


4 PM

The well-heeled Vitória neighborhood is known for museums and galleries, such as Paulo Darzé Galeria, showcasing contemporary Bahian and Brazilian sculpture, photography, mixed-media, and painting. A few blocks away, Museu de Arte da Bahia, one of Brazil's oldest museums, displays an impressive collection of paintings and decorative arts.

Locals gather at tiny **Fisherman's Village** on Rio Vermelho Beach to wrap

up afternoons playing backgammon or cards. It's an ideal spot for sunset photos before heading across the street to Manga, a chic restaurant from Salvador-born chef Dante Bassi and his German partner, Katrin, who met while working at São Paulo's celebrated D.O.M. The casual first-floor bar is the neighborhood hot spot for local craft beers, charcuterie boards, and small plates to share. Upstairs, the couple turns out refined 7- and 12-course seasonal tasting menus with standout dishes such as watermelon salad with cucumber, seaweed, and baru nuts, and crab soup with corn and roasted cabbage custard. Each dish, intricately plated with branches, moss, or other natural elements, is an adventure for the eyes as much as the palate.



Sail into Salvador



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

SETTING OUT SOLO CAN BE THE ULTIMATE RESET.

ot Long ago I traveled to Istanbul, by myself, with deliciously few plans. I spent afternoons riding the Bosporus ferries between the city's seaside neighborhoods, sipping tulip glasses of the sweet, tannic tea served on board. Inside the cabins, buskers played Turkish folk songs on slender-necked tanburs. Only when dusk faded the city's minarets to shadows would I come ashore, in search of a waterfront dinner as leisurely as my day had been.

I savor these solo meals. Each time I'm in Paris, I take myself out: I'll bring a book and prop my elbows on a bistro's zinc-topped bar, dining to the balletic murmur of popped corks, clinking

silver, and quiet conversation. Even without the addition of a *crème au caramel*, that sort of night feels like an over-the-top indulgence.

At times I want the world all to myself. Without a companion's pleasant distraction, new sounds and aromas recalibrate my senses. On many journeys I've learned how sweet a little solitude can be, but often, going it alone sparks connections that turn to fast friendships too. After a sunny-faced Parisienne sat beside me in a Luang Prabang patisserie, we spent two days swapping stories on the Mekong River in a slow wooden boat.

Researchers have found that spending time alone has the potential to

increase creativity, self-exploration, and renewal. And traveling alone is trending, with Google searches for "solo travel" having grown steadily in the past five years. Companies are responding to the demand, offering special pricing and trips catered to solo travelers. Some travelers are seeking a grand adventure; others see alone time as a lavish gift to themselves.

"Traveling by myself has an element of luxury," says Denver-based Virtuoso advisor Dana Welch, who recently treated herself to a retreat at Mexico's Rancho La Puerta. "I didn't feel obligated to look out for someone else. I did whatever I wanted, ordered room service when I wanted. I engaged with other people, but I spent a lot of time by myself."

For many, seeking that kind of solitude may feel like unfamiliar territory. Booking a table for one can be intimidating, much less traveling across an ocean. For the solo-curious, a little might go a long way. Planning an afternoon alone in an unfamiliar neighborhood is a good place to start, while group trips catering to solo travelers offer the best of both worlds.

Wherever you find it, the benefits of such time alone can linger. When you're by yourself, emotional chatter – what experts call "activation" – begins to ease, says psychologist Thuy-vy Nguyen, who studies solitude at Durham University in the UK. "That leaves space for calm and relaxation. When we go into a state of solitude, it's like hitting a reset button."

Solo travel can be a reset, or even a kind of chapter break, an unwritten page hinting that your story might soon take an unexpected turn. A few years ago, I spent a long weekend alone in Vienna, one night catching a spellbinding performance of Handel's Alcina amid the Vienna State Opera's gilded grandeur. At intermission, I drifted toward the bar alongside elegant attendees. Then I slipped away by myself. Bubbly in hand, I followed a sweeping marble staircase down to a vaulted lobby, luxuriating in my fleeting solitude, happily alone in the crowd until the music struck up once more.



Solo Sojourns

GO Some of **AmaWaterways**' ships feature single-occupancy staterooms (with French balconies) for solo travelers. Watch European landscapes unreel aboard the 144-passenger *AmaDante* as it traverses the Seine River on a seven-night sailing between Paris and Le Havre. Consider pre- or post-trip sojourns in the City of Light, whose spate of recent openings includes the 72-room Cheval Blanc Paris and Bourse de Commerce – Pinault Collection, home to more than 10,000 pieces of contemporary art. *Departures: Multiple dates, September 17, 2022, through October 21, 2023; from \$2,849.*

Dozens of single-occupancy ocean-view staterooms, slightly smaller in size, debut this fall aboard four **Oceania Cruises** ships – the *Regatta*, *Nautica*, *Insignia*, and *Sirena* – making solo travel at sea more appealing. Settle into one during a ten-night voyage round-trip from Bridgetown, Barbados, on the 648-passenger *Sirena*. *Departure: December 10: from \$2.299*.

All-female expeditions from **Intrepid Travel** relaunched this year, giving solo travelers a chance to team up with small groups for big adventures. Such women-only trips mean eye-opening access to places – such as hijab-free Iranian beauty salons – where males are forbidden. One highlight of an eight-day Morocco journey: following hiking trails into the High Atlas mountains, where, in the village of Bou Tharar, travelers join local women to apply and wear exquisite kohl and henna and don traditional Amazigh dress. *Departures: Multiple dates, September 10, 2022, to November 11, 2023; from \$1,135.*

While many companies append charges for single travelers, **Luxury Gold** reduces fees for some trips to make big solo journeys more approachable. The outfitter's small-group itineraries span six continents with a focus on immersive, VIP experiences, such as a meet and greet with a former All Blacks rugby player during an eight-day jaunt across New Zealand's North Island. *Departures: Multiple dates, December 16, 2022, through March 21, 2025; from \$5,080.* **9**

O CALL DELHI a shopping gold mine would be like tagging Rome a hot spot for pasta – it doesn't exactly let the cat out of the bag. Whether you need it, want it, forgot to buy it elsewhere, or just simply have to have it, this sprawling megalopolis of more than 20 million people undoubtedly sells it. Home to hypnotic markets and scores of upscale boutiques, the city (which comprises Old Delhi and New Delhi, the official capital) is thrillingly colorful and chaotic – a hodgepodge of snarled lanes and the relentless din of honking, zipping tuk-tuks.

Shopping here requires a road map in addition to your double chai. To help you make the most of Delhi's treasures –

and to help assuage any sensory deluge – we've zeroed in on five stylish Indian souvenirs and the chic (and haggle-free) shops to visit for the ultimate take-home find. From artisan saris to handwoven cashmere, these aren't just primo keepsakes – they're a window into a country and its people.

Cashmere Scarves and Shawls SANDUQ

The term "pashmina" has become generic the world over for just about any softer-than-normal scarf or wrap. And while you can find quality cashmere in Delhi's wonderful maze of bazaars, vendors often claim authenticity at the expense of the uneducated buyer. Only


the seasoned shopper (and trained eye) can pinpoint pure pashmina, the superfine cashmere wool of northern India.

Enter Sanduq, a luxury boutique that sources Kashmir Changthang pashmina - the warmest and softest wool on earth - from Changpa herdsmen in the subcontinent's Ladakh region. Living at an altitude of 14,000 feet, pashmina goats, known as Changthangis, have a thick undercoat that produces fibers six times finer and ten times softer than a human hair. Sanduq (Kashmiri for "treasure chest") works directly with female weavers, who make each product by hand, applying intricate needlepoint stitching. Depending on the ornateness of each design, an embroidered shawl can take two months to three years to complete. Store cofounder Iqbal Mehboob compares those on the latter timeline to museum pieces.

This type of quality ware comes at a price, of course. Basic cashmere scarves push \$300; shawls start at \$375. For embroidered fabrics, carpets, and bedding, prepare to pay top dollar. "Sanduq is a tribute to the women of Kashmir," Mehboob says.

Silk Saris L'AFFAIRE

When Donna Karan endorses your label, you're probably on the right









path. At L'affaire, creative director Swami Krishna Aroop's saris aren't just magic on fabric (and they *are*); they're a preservation of Indian culture. Reverently displayed like works of art (some paired with Sufi verses), each collection celebrates an Indian-specific weaving, printing, dyeing, painting, or embroidery style.

Take the meticulous technique of the Khatri community in Kutch, Gujarat, for example, where artisans work together to create saris that can have upwards of 100,000 hand-tied knots. When done with silk, these designs, known as Bandhini - from the Sanskrit word bandh, meaning "to tie" - are technical and historical masterpieces. L'affaire also stocks Baluchar saris from West Bengal, famous for their rich silk and intricate mythological depictions. For years, Aroop has worked tirelessly to support textile weaving. In his words: "If I take away the sari from the Indian subcontinent, I take away the soul of the country."





Homewares GOOD EARTH

This luxe design house in New Delhi's lively Khan Market is an interior decorator's dream depot. Inspired by nature, Good Earth sells an elaborate range of classic and modern home decor stamped with an Indian ethos. For dining (the brand's most popular niche), look for hand-block-printed Mysore tablecloths and napkins patterned with palms and elephants; for the kitchen, pick up its high-end dinnerware adorned with floral and ocean motifs. Both make ideal wedding and housewarming gifts.

Those with an eye for design will find it hard not to stock up on the cheerful textiles and accessories. The selection of pastel-toned bedspreads, tiger-striped Tanjore silk cushions, and silver-polished brass *diyas* (oil lamps) makes it easy to brighten interiors with the spirit of India.

Jewelry and Accessories OLIVIA DAR

This woman-owned boutique in Shahpur Jat, one of Delhi's trendiest neighborhoods, lends itself well to haute couture, blending French artistry with Indian craftsmanship. The eponymous line's colorful, bohemian statement pieces, worn from Bollywood to Hollywood, won't break the bank. The tasseled bracelets, hand-embroidered talisman necklaces, sparkle-eye brooches, and sequined peacock earrings (India's national bird) are inspired by Dar's adventures around the globe.

Leather Goods NAPPA DORI


The brainchild of National Institute of Fashion Technology graduate Gautam Sinha, Nappa Dori's modish leather goods could turn a staunch homebody into an ardent world traveler. The makers of this posh accessories label - Hindi for "leather" (nappa) and "thread" (dori) - handcraft trunks, satchels, and backpacks in homage to the visuals of India, including maharaja-adorned passport cases and rickshaw- and elephant-imprinted wallets, among other items. Launched in 2010 in a quaint Hauz Khas Village studio, the brand has since opened the Nappa Dori Warehouse, an airy concept store that's home to a design library, atelier, and European-style café.

Dig into Delhi

GO Virtuoso on-site connection **Greaves Tours** works with travel advisors to craft custom itineraries across the subcontinent, including guided shopping excursions that can be tailor-made to interests. On a 16-day tour of northern India, for example, travelers can visit the Taj Mahal at sunrise, track Bengal tigers in Ranthambore National Park, and explore the temples of Khajuraho, a UNESCO World Heritage site. *Departures: Any day October 1 through 2022; from \$7,750.*

STAY Long a landmark for the city's elite, **The Oberoi**, **New Delhi** provides a swank oasis with 24-hour butler service and 220 iPad-controlled rooms. For shopping enthusiasts, its Material Girl Tour offers a customized retail experience with a private shopping guide. *Doubles from* \$360, including breakfast daily and one lunch or dinner for two.

The 254-room **Leela Palace New Delhi** is a lavish retreat bedecked with Italian chandeliers and gold-leafed domes in the Diplomatic Enclave. Book a tour on its art walk for a lesson about its diverse collection of contemporary Indian art, then head to the rooftop Library Bar for some of the best cocktails in town. *Doubles from \$179, including breakfast daily and one dinner for two.* **9**









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N A SUNDAY NIGHT in May, Drift restaurant is humming. At one table, eight women laugh over appetizers, local rosé, and a bride-to-be. At another, parents visit with their university-aged daughter and her uneasy boyfriend. The place is packed, and almost every stool at the bar is taken by solo diners or couples waiting for a table. Throughout our meal, my husband and I watch people turn up to the door and leave when they learn the wait.

Not so long ago, Halifax's scene was limited to a few restaurants, pubs, and shoreside kiosks. Canada's largest Maritime city has, for much of the time since its 1749 founding, held fast to its "quiet by day, raucous by night" reputation – which has served it well with everyone from cruising seniors to families and university students. But there's something new in the salty air: Halifax is growing up.

The cranes that fill the city are only the latest wave of a consistent push forward. "Many people think of Halifax as a shipping hub or a small, foggy fishing city with rugged coastlines," says Virtuoso travel advisor Myranda Miller, who's lived here for years. "We have all that. But they're surprised by the outdoor activities and spaces – the parks, the patios – and how easy it is to get around."

The city's newest unveiling is the Queen's Marque, an upscale development that more than doubled the waterfront's public space and introduced the Maritimes' first luxury boutique hotel, Muir (Gaelic for "sea"), home to Drift. Those would-be diners who balked at the wait times simply had to shift their palate to avoid disappointment. Steps away, Bar Sofia's chef, Anthony Walsh, offers South American tapas and stiff margaritas in a space filled with Rafael Silveira's surrealist paintings - more classic Miami than Canadian seaside. Around the corner, Café Lunette greets the day with coffee and viennoiserie (pains au chocolat and lemon poppyseed madeleines among them) and wraps up with Parisian bistro

cuisine (including delicious duck confit) at night. Coming soon: a wine bar, a noodle bar, and more.

In fact, all across town new restaurants, galleries, and shops are opening just in time for travelers' return. In short, this isn't the Halifax of yesteryear. "It's more modernized and artsy," Miller says. "But in a good way."

Our early-morning walks along the 2.5-mile stretch of boardwalk outside the Muir place us a few hours ahead of the cruise-ship crowds. One morning we pop into the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21, dedicated to the thousands of families who entered here. On another, we take first pick of the multicolored Adirondack chairs that dot the shoreline, before dipping into a line-free ice-cream counter inside Peace by Chocolate, the first brick-and-mortar store for a chocolate company founded by Syrian refugees who give back to international causes. On the north end of town, we discover the small Africville Museum, dedicated

to the Black community that thrived on the shore of Bedford Basin until they were forced from their homes in the late 1960s.

After a few days, we venture out to explore Nova Scotia. An hour's drive north brings us to Wolfville, a university town of restored Victorian homes and a classic small-town Main Street peppered with brewpub and cidery patios, small boutiques, and galleries. Wolfville sits on the Minas Basin – part of the Bay of Fundy, which is famous for having the world's highest tidal range – and serves as the gateway to Annapolis Valley wineries. We spend a few leisurely hours at Lightfoot & Wolfville, an organic winery where sheep and pigs often roam free as visitors sip vintages paired with local oysters. Most

of the wines are unavailable outside the province; later, we'll recognize some of their names on Halifax menus.

On our last afternoon, we take to the water that's such a large part of the city's identity aboard the Muir's 36-foot Morris yacht, *Little Wing*. Our captain points out Georges Island, the tiny National Historic Site set in the middle of Halifax Harbour, and neighboring Dartmouth (The Wooden Monkey, a harbor-front vegan restaurant, is apparently reason enough to hop the water taxi across). As we sail, the pace of this far southeast corner of Canada truly takes hold: It's unassumingly laid-back. But as we know, come sunset, a rollicking – if, these days, a bit more refined – good time awaits us ashore.


Head for Halifax

STAY The new 109-room **Muir** channels the city's maritime traditions through shipbuilding materials such as Muntz metal and granite reclaimed from the Halifax seawall. A private art gallery, dining that celebrates local seafood, and exclusive access to the hotel's BKS speakeasy and *Little Wing* yacht make it one of the province's most anticipated arrivals. *Doubles from \$330, including breakfast daily and a \$100 hotel credit.*






It's also your jumping off point for exploring the majestic **Jungfrau Region**, home to the Eiger, Mönch and Jungfrau (UNESCO World Heritage site). Leave summer behind for fresh icy air and snow-swept panoramas when you hop aboard the iconic **Jungfrau Railway** to the highest railway station in Europe, the Jungfraujoch – Top of Europe, which is now just 45 minutes from the new Grindelwald Terminal.

Culture City 2022" by LCD Awards. Need more proof?
It has one of the highest densities of Gault & Millau
rated restaurants per square mile in the world.
Taste wines from Lausanne's two winegrowing
regions – Lavaux, a UNESCO Heritage Site, and la
Côté – at one of the many wine bars in the city, or
inside the cellars themselves.

Leave the lake for **Zermatt**, home to the most-photographed mountain in the world. This remote, car-free village draws intrepid mountaineers, nature lovers, and foodies alike thanks to its long list of world-class accommodations, and of course, its pièce de resistance: the Matterhorn. While Zermatt has long been a seasonal destination, one 5-star hotel, the historic Grand Hotel Zermatterhof, is keeping its glass doors open and horse-drawn carriages running up to Faster 2023.







From here, take the **Glacier Express** – the world's slowest express train – to **St. Moritz**, the lavish Alpine resort town that was the birthplace of winter mountain tourism in the 1860s, and which today hosts the world's only polo tournament on snow. This classic panoramic trip crosses 291 bridges, two UNESCO World Heritage sites (Swiss Alps Jungfrau-Aletsch and Bernina Landscapes), and offers unrestricted views of the remote Rhine Gorge, known as the Swiss Grand Canyon.


Par Excellence: A seven-course menu with wine pairings, personal concierge, and guaranteed window seat? It's easy to see why the new Excellence Class aboard the Glacier Express are the most soughtafter seats in Switzerland. Just be sure to make a reservation in advance.

For the grand finale, savor the flavors of the Mediterranean with a sojourn in **Ticino** – where Swiss precision meets Italian pizzazz. Tucked along the country's southern region on the Italian border, this unique cultural destination invites you to experience la dolce vita with culinary treasures such as Ticinese risotto and its prized merlots (Ticino is the only place in the world that makes a dry white merlot) along with stimulating art galleries, museums, festivals, and endless outdoor activities. Arrivederci, Svizzera!





MY PERSONAL WORK BEGAN

as a way to celebrate the beauty of the African woman through the fabrics she wears. I quickly realized, however, there's so much more to it than what we wear or how we look. I wanted to celebrate everything I struggled with in my own beauty journey: my hair, my skin, and my identity as a modern woman living in a more traditional culture.

I called this series *Camo* because the subject of each image camouflages into the background. As individuals, we can lose ourselves to cultural expectations, yet there are such unique and beautiful things about every one of us. It's a little ironic: I want my models to blend into the background even as they stand out.

Camo is joyful art inspired by the joyful people of Kenya. Kenyan men, women, and children dress up in outfits made from brightly colored traditional fabrics whenever we want to look our best, especially at big events. You might see the same fabric on several women, but they each wear it differently, reflecting their personalities.

The objects I use to make the accessories in *Camo* are items I interact with daily as a Kenyan. They were fixtures of my childhood, used by my mother (and probably even my grandmother). I've incorporated bottle tops, plastic combs, sieves, straws, and even bottle brushes. Kenyans are resourceful repurposers. Handheld plastic mirrors might be used as side mirrors on a bicycle weaving through traffic or even as decorative clothing accessories on a Maasai warrior!

The eyewear in one photo, for example, is made from pins often found at the hair stalls in distinct red and yellow fan-shaped holders that have remained unchanged since the 1980s. Another one uses mosquito coils, and a third bicycle gears reminiscent of those found on popular Kenyan bikes from the brand known as Black Mamba. I enjoy fabricating the *Camo* eyewear the most because it requires me to see ordinary objects as the foundation for exciting fashion accessories.


Before creating each new image, I research traditional African hairstyles, then work with a stylist to design a modern interpretation of the hair. I also source fabrics from marketplaces across Africa. This is the hardest part because I'm looking for very specific, colorful pieces. I believe each piece has a personality, and I try to design an outfit that makes the print come alive, working with a local tailor to stitch the clothes.

The more I delve into the *Camo* series, the more I learn about my own culture, people, and history. The project has allowed me to view my heritage in a new way. I'm often asked if my works are paintings, and many viewers are shocked to discover the images are all shot in one frame with no Photoshopping. Once or twice, I've watched viewers sneak a quick selfie with my prints, mimicking the model's pose. I'm always delighted to see people joyfully interacting with my work.

THANDIWE MURIU'S KENYA

IF YOU HAVE TIME, I SUGGEST TRAVELING THE COUNTRY BY ROAD, to take in the diverse scenery and catch some adventures along the way. From escarpments to tea fields, beaches to hilly towns, Kenya has it all.

Begin in Nairobi, a city that's coming alive artistically. There are metalsmiths crafting bold creations and Maasai markets around the city where skilled hands bead beautiful works. The joy of Nairobi is the warmth of its people, and a smile is readily available in every interaction.

One of my top spots to view and photograph elephants is Amboseli National Park, where they roam in big herds, peacefully foraging. It was there that I saw my first ever "super tusker," Tim, who had tusks almost to the ground. He was magnificent.

The bush is hot and dusty, so why not round off the trip sipping drinks on Lamu's magnificent beaches, where there's magic in the air? Visiting this little island is like stepping back in time to when life was unhurried. Fun fact: There are only two cars on the island – everyone uses boats and donkeys to get around!

GO Take Muriu's tips for a spin with a Kenya exploration from Virtuoso on-site tour connection **andBeyond Kenya**. The nine-day journey by road begins with two nights in Nairobi and visits to the Karen Blixen Museum, the Giraffe Centre, and the elephants of the Sheldrick Wildlife Trust. Two nights in Amboseli National Park follow, with Mount Kilimanjaro in the distance and wildlife viewing led by Maasai guides. Doubles from \$3,040, including all meals and beverages, twice-daily game drives, transfers from Olare Orok airstrip, local market visits, and a \$100 gift shop or spa credit.


Nairobi's **Fairmont The Norfolk** has hosted a parade of luminary safari-goers since its 1904 opening and provides a verdant base for city explorations. The 139 rooms and suites set around tropical gardens make for an easy retreat from city life. Doubles from \$239, including breakfast daily and one 50-minute massage for two.

At **Hemingways Nairobi** in the city's Karen suburb, each of the 45 suites (the smallest are 860 square feet) gets a dedicated butler. Suites also have balconies facing the Ngong Hills, walk-in closets, and canopy beds. The hotel gives travelers quick access to Nairobi classics, including the Sheldrick Wildlife Trust and the Giraffe Centre. Doubles from \$730, including breakfast daily and one 50-minute massage for two. **9**









ITS OF WHITE ICE BOB AROUND OUR SHIP in the dark-blue sea, and every so often an iceberg floats by. It's 5:30 AM aboard National Geographic Resolution, but the sun hasn't set all night. The vessel, on its inaugural voyage to the Arctic, glides silently up a bright fjord, and I'm up early – too excited to sleep – taking in the beauty while northern fulmars streak past like wingmen.

What are the words beyond "beautiful"? Mesmerized, I realize I've forgotten them during these long pandemic years at home. To starboard and port, snow-fields etched with reindeer tracks sweep toward black cliffs dusted in snow. Straight off the bow, an aquamarine glacier gleams beneath crystalline sky. I sit and gape. What are the words for a landscape that seems so timeless it brings tears to your eyes?

Lindblad Expeditions was venturing to the high Arctic earlier than usual – in April – with a trip to Svalbard aboard its newest polar vessel, the 126-passenger *Resolution*, named after British explorer Captain James Cook's HMS *Resolution*. I'd signed on with my husband, Jeff, when we learned that Sven-Olof Lindblad, the company's pioneering founder and board co-chair, would be joining this first-ever spring sailing.

Now, triple-vaxed, PCR tested, and well caffeinated, I've already found what will become my favorite place on the ship: the library, a light-filled aerie of blond wood and floor-to-ceiling glass with 270-degree views overlooking the ship's bow. Perched in a caramel-colored leather chair that's tethered to the carpet in case of rough seas, I've made myself a cappuccino, helped myself to a pair of Bushnell binoculars, and am sitting in bliss, taking in the sea, the sky, the snow.

The landscape seems untouched, silent and permanent, but one of the reasons so many of us have come so far to see it is that it's not. The Arctic is unraveling, melting at a frightening rate due to climate change. A new nature and climate study predicts that summer sea ice floating on the surface of the Arctic Ocean could disappear entirely by 2035. (Until recently, scientists didn't think we'd reach this point until 2050 at the earliest.) The Arctic is warming more than twice as fast as the rest of the planet, and there's no element of life unaffected by the immense rate of change here. Many of us have come because the Arctic as we know it – a vast, icy landscape where polar bears prowl and reindeer roam – may soon be just a memory.

"I first visited Svalbard in July 1973 and drove Zodiacs for my dad's ship, the *Lind-blad Explorer*," Sven tells us over cocktails that night. "Back then, the place was so

thick with ice that July was the earliest you could get through it. Now, most of the sea ice is gone by May and June, and the challenge is where to find it."

This early in spring, there's still plenty of ice, thankfully. Drawing our cabin's thick drapes that first morning and squinting out at the midnight sun, my sharp-eyed husband spotted polar-bear tracks crossing an ice floe right beneath our balcony. Not bad for $6\,\mathrm{AM}$.

But knowing how little will soon be left of the ice is heartbreaking. "My hope is that this expedition will be both an experience and a conversation," Sven had added. "While we profoundly lament this march toward ice extinction, being here this early in the season, a time unthinkable a decade ago, is a wonderful opportunity."

"Arctic" is derived from *arktos*, the Greek word for "bear." I would love to see a polar bear in the wild, but there are no guarantees – especially as the ice continues to melt, putting more pressure on bear populations. Jeff snaps an iPhone pic of the tracks, and we scan the scattered floes, on the lookout for cream-colored fur.

THE DAY BEFORE, WE'D RENDEZVOUSED with our 67 fellow passengers in Oslo, Norway, then taken an early-morning charter flight to the Svalbard archipelago, landing in Longyearbyen, the world's northernmost town. Tucked between snow-covered mountains some 800 miles above the Arctic Circle, Longyearbyen is a tiny, quirky place, home to about 2.400 people, a university, the famous Svalbard Global

quirky place, home to about 2,400 people, a university, the famous Svalbard Global Seed Vault (which stores roughly 1 million seed samples from around the world in case of apocalyptic disasters), and about 2,500 snowmobiles.

Boarding our ship after buying last-minute gloves and Nordic wool caps along the town's snowy main drag, we can't quite believe we're not only here, but here for the first commercial trip of the season. By summer there will be 30 cruise ships plying these waters (and more than 50 in Antarctica between November and February).

"Polar travel appeals to the curious at heart who want to venture into the wild and remote corners of the world. Age is no barrier," says Calgary-based Virtuoso travel advisor Jenni Evans. "But it's important to choose the right ship." She adds that the most efficient and eco-friendly ships are purpose-built to protect the sea and release fewer emissions. They also have dynamic-positioning systems to avoid using anchors in fragile environments. And of course, Evans advises, smaller expedition vessels carry fewer guests, leaving less impact on protected shores and wildlife.

Departing the dock at Longyearbyen, relieved to know our ship has all these things – as well as one of the industry's highest ice-class ratings – we turn to starboard and head north, toward Spitsbergen Island's northwest coast. Our plan is to be "unplanned," according to expedition leader Bud Lehnhausen, allowing the ship's expedition team freedom to pivot when weather calls for kayaking or a walrus encounter. "We're hoping to get up to about 80 degrees north and into lots of pack ice," Bud adds, grinning.

Sure enough, when we wake the next morning and pad up to the bridge (open to everyone 24/7 to check out the high-tech nav systems; meet our trip's captain, Heidi Norling, and navigator, Nicole Pickering; and observe the action as it unfolds), a huge electronic chart table shows the *Resolution* blasting north from Svalbard like a spaceship. Our position: 81.45 degrees.

Outside, it's snowing lightly, the crew is sweeping snow and ice off the decks, and there's pack ice as far as you can see. The air temperature is 21 degrees, and many of us are bundled up on the bow before breakfast. It's hypnotic watching the ship's prow crunch through solid ice, splitting it into a geometry of white jigsaw pieces with black water borders.

Half a dozen Filipino crew members are taking videos, enjoying the novelty of the icebreaker as much as we are. The ship shudders slightly. Aside from the deeply satisfying crunch of ice, we're cut off from all the noise and intrusion of modern-day life (Wi-Fi comes and goes this far north). It feels like a rare luxury, experiencing a place surrounded by silence that stretches all the way to Siberia.

One of the wonders of polar travel today is being able to witness unforgiving environments in extreme comfort. We packed for our ten-night trip to the Arctic in wheeled carry-ons, knowing that Lindblad's faux-fur-trimmed parkas (which travelers get to keep), puffy jackets, and thick neoprene boots – all ordered to fit in advance – would be waiting on board. It was chilly on deck, especially if the wind was blowing, but dressed in my layers I was rarely cold.

For me the greatest pleasure, however, was being inside the light-filled ship, looking out. In addition to the extensive library lounge (with a fireplace and "fire" consisting of water-vapor flames), *Resolution* and its sister ship, *Endurance*, each have a spacious yoga studio with a view off the stern, a spa whose saunas and massage rooms also have astonishing views, two infinity-edge Jacuzzi pools perched so you can sit outside in your swimsuit and watch the snow-covered ridges recede, a light-drenched lounge and bar with more 270-degree views, two restaurants, and the open bridge – with room for dozens of guests at a time and passed hors d'oeuvres during cocktail-hour wildlife sightings.

The design throughout is contemporary Scandinavian: understated, comfortable, and elegant. In the main dining room, tables for two to eight passengers press up against floor-to-ceiling windows. It's delightful having dinner while frozen landscapes pass by and warmth from the ship's super-efficient heating system wafts round your knees. Rather than the standard shipboard buffets of yore, meals are plated and ordered from daily menus, minimizing Covid risk. On rotating nights



each guest is invited to join a private seating of 12 to 20 at the "Cook's Nook" – a long table on the Observation Deck inspired by Captain Cook's officers' table – for a seven-course tasting menu ranging from salmon gravlax with avocado-wasabi puree to braised lamb with shiitake mushrooms.

As the days pass by, I entertain a fantasy that I'm one of the expedition crew and the ship is our floating home – a home designed exceptionally well for exploration. In the evenings there are terrific lectures by onboard naturalists and, on our trip, National Geographic photographer Camille Seaman. And almost every day there's an unexpected adventure. When we suit up and Zodiac ashore for our first walk in the Arctic – "No wandering off!" our guide, Stefano, reminds us, pointing out Petter the polar-bear guard standing watch on a hill with a rifle – we encounter a herd of Svalbard reindeer, a furry, short-legged subspecies found only in these islands. While the deer put on a show racing over the frozen tundra, we learn how they've evolved to eat and eat and eat all summer long, gaining 100 pounds a year to fatten up and survive the winter.

"Imagine how much salad you'd have to eat to gain 100 pounds a year," Stefano quips, and it occurs to me I might as well relax and try everything on the menu since extra padding in the Arctic keeps you warmer.

Another day Captain Norling noses the ship up to towering black cliff faces while thousands of black-and-white Brünnich's guillemots swirl above the icy white waves crashing below. Even the colors of the birds are striking, the sheer contrast of black and white drawing so much of this landscape together. Millions of birds flock to Svalbard to nest on the rock outcroppings of the coastline's near-vertical cliffs. It's a stirring sight, and we all rush out on deck – Sven Lindblad in his flip-flops and a few spa-goers in white bathrobes. A festive air pervades the Observation Lounge, everyone high on seabirds and fresh, invigorating Arctic air.

After sharing several outings and meals, we're soon on a first-name basis with half our fellow adventurers. A well-traveled bunch, they range from age 10 to 83, and many are serious amateur photographers. Several had originally booked this trip two years ago and are here now that pandemic travel restrictions have eased. One tells me his wife got a great bonus at work and they'd decided to splurge on a big trip. "Polar bear or penguin?" she'd asked.

By the fifth night we've seen a mother bear and two cubs far off in the distance, but you can tell the photographers are getting anxious. Finally, an announcement comes that a bear has been spotted off the bow, and everyone crowds onto the bridge. An excited buzz fills the space. It's cocktail hour, and Captain Norling and Navigation Officer Pickering run the show, inching the ship silently, slowly, through brilliant sun-burnished ice toward a young polar bear standing in the midst of a pure-white expanse.

It's a thrilling scene, but what makes it unforgettable is that the bear is drenched in blood. She's just killed a seal, and her cream-colored chest, forepaws, and face gleam strawberry-red. White gulls line up, fluttering their wings like an audience that can't sit still, and we're riveted. The white. The bear. The blood. At its most primal level the world is cruel, but also beautiful.

After dramatic encounters like this, it's a comfort to retreat to our sunlit cabin with its spacious sitting area, command-center desk (equipped with an iPad, Bose speaker, and National Geographic atlas), sliding glass doors opening onto a big balcony, walk-in closet, and bathroom with a tub. I love our cabin so much I regrettably never try the ship's two "igloos," which have a waiting list of passengers eager to sleep out atop the stern under geodesic glass with hot water bottles and wool blankets for warmth.

The last day of our trip we wake to pale-blue skies streaked with cirrus clouds and speed toward shore for a final walk on the ice. A glacier topped with crenellated peaks sparkles before us, and we take in the silence, the bright warmth of the sun. The full privilege of visiting the Arctic hits me then. The ice we're cruising through is rare and becoming more rare. The remarkable and unusual and bloody animals all rely on ice. And we rely on it too – it's the air conditioner of our planet.

As the Zodiac lands at the edge of the shimmering ice field, I take a long look at the scene before me, the snow piled so light and dry it's like sugar, pray we'll figure out how to save it all somehow, and step ashore.

GO NORTH

Lindblad Expeditions will be running ten-night expeditions to Arctic Svalbard aboard the 126-passenger National Geographic Resolution and sister ship National Geographic Endurance - the first new polar builds in Lindblad's 50year history - in May and June 2023, with early-spring trips again in April 2024. Adventurous guests cruise with National Geographic photographers and Lindblad-certified photo instructors and naturalists, sharing kayaks, ice walks, and Zodiac encounters with walrus and icebergs aboard a fully stabilized, ice-class vessel. With its new 132-passenger, carbon-neutral, ice-class *Sylvia Earle* launching in November 2022, **Aurora Expeditions** takes cruisers on a leisurely 14-night exploration of Svalbard. Some highlights: venturing close to 80 degrees north, hiking over summer tundra abloom with wildflowers, and searching for polar bears, arctic foxes, whales, and puffins. *Departure: June 26, 2023; from \$12,956.*

Silversea's eight-night, late-summer Tromsø-to-Longyearbyen expedition aboard the 274-passenger Silver Wind (converted to ice class in 2021) crosses from the tip of mainland Norway to Svalbard, including stops at Gjesværstappan, one of the world's most remote nesting sites for seabirds, and Bear Island, on the border of the Norwegian and Barents seas. The trip includes airfare to and from your point of departure and butler service in every suite. Departure: July 21, 2023; from \$11,800.

Quark Expeditions' 13-night sailing from Aberdeen, Scotland, to Longyearbyen on the 128-passenger Ocean Adventurer crosses the North Atlantic to some of the most remote islands on earth. Cruisers spend two days exploring the rugged Faroe Islands, sail to the rarely visited volcanic island of Jan Mayen, and spend three days in southern Svalbard − plus four days at sea. Departure: May 15, 2023; from \$7.891. ♥









Stardate 2071

I've just returned from OSS Hope, the United Arab Emirates' space station floating 370 miles above Earth. From the shuttle on our descent to Dubai, I observed a cityscape needled with sky-scrapers that dwarfed the Burj Khalifa, the world's tallest tower back in the 2020s. Autonomous drones zoomed past before we touched down and disembarked inside a neon-lit library that reminded me of a Yayoi Kusama installation – quite magical, really – though some of my fellow passengers seemed to prefer experiencing our virtual reality journey

through the viewfinder of their phones' cameras. How very 2022 of them.

For now, this optimistic vision remains an LED-powered mirage – one of the handful of exhibitions at Dubai's new Museum of the Future, a boundary-pushing structure shaped like a giant silver lobster claw bedecked in Arabic calligraphy. It debuted to much fanfare this year just as the World Expo wrapped up, and tickets book out days in advance.

In reality, Dubai's lightning-fast progression is palpable. In this giant sandbox

of glass and steel, you can't look anywhere without spotting at least a handful of cranes. Everywhere, construction workers are busy building towers higher and architecturally bolder than the ones already scraping the sky. Nothing seems impossible here.

The UAE's largest city is one of superlatives, after all: a place of freezing ski runs in a desert where temperatures often surpass 100 degrees, of Rolls-Royces parked in front of one of the world's largest malls, of condo towers so high that residents on the top floors start their iftar (a sundown meal breaking the daily fast during Ramadan) three minutes after those at ground level because the sun sets later from their vantage point.

To say that Dubai is having quite the run would be an understatement. As one of the first global tourism hubs to reopen during the pandemic (in July 2020), it became a haven for remote workers and perpetual sunseekers escaping mask mandates and lockdowns at home. Expo 2020, which delayed its opening until October of last year, delivered another boost: By the time of its final show at the tail end of March, the visitor tally had clocked in at almost 25 million. There's the Museum of the Future, of course, and this fall sees the

highly anticipated arrival of the Atlantis The Royal Dubai resort, with its 90plus swimming pools and restaurants – a whopping 18 in total – by some of the world's top chefs, including Heston Blumenthal and José Andrés.

No wonder, then, that on any ordinary weekday morning, travelers will find the Jumeirah Al Naseem hotel buzzing with life. From my room, a lofty, creamcolored abode with a bed wide enough to comfortably sleep a camel, I overlooked throngs of vacationers dipping in and out of the Windex-blue Persian Gulf. They were only a fraction of the guests checked in at the rooms and villas composing Madinat Jumeirah, a beachfront jumble of resorts so sprawling I needed a map (and a buggy) to get around. Among its facilities: more than 40 restaurants, 19 indoor and outdoor pools, and a mile of sugar-white sand on which to spend lazy afternoons wondering how Jumeirah keeps the massive gardens so lush and teeming with birds.


Drive up or down the city's coastline, and you'll find a pick-and-mix of spots for year-round sunbathing, from humble public beaches to private stretches of sand with bottle service at thumping beach clubs. The infinity-pooled Drift Beach Club at the One&Only Royal Mirage gets top marks, but family-friendly Madinat has several other tricks up its sleeve: Wild Wadi Waterpark, with 17

swirling waterslides, including the fastest free-fall slide outside North America; and a full-fledged souk. It's a beachside Disneyland for grown-ups, minus the costumed ducks and mice.

THOUGH DUBAI often grabs headlines for its glitz and over-the-top Saturday brunches, there are equal pleasures to be found in its simpler joys. One afternoon I strolled through the Old Town straddling Dubai Creek. In the Spice Souk's incense-swirled alleys, Technicolor market stalls overflowed with everything from Gobstopper-size spheres of dried indigo and tiny rosebuds to crystalline teardrops of solidified acacia gum sold as a postnatal folk remedy. The droning syllables of the muezzin's call to prayer echoed between the souk's sandstone walls as droves of kandura-clad men shuffled to its source.

For a single dirham (about 25 cents), I crossed the creek on an abra, one of the traditional no-frills wooden ferries that ply the water 24 hours a day. This corner of town is home to Dubai's oldest remaining building, the eighteenth-century Al Fahidi Fort, with its merloned walls and coral stone watchtowers in the crème caramel hue that defines most of the Gulf's ancient architecture. Around the corner, the popular Arabian Tea House turns out tandoorfresh flatbread and sweet karak tea with cardamom and milk - a wicker-chaired throwback to when locals sought refuge from the midday heat in breezy tea

parlors rather than air-conditioned megamalls. The teahouse is perched on the edge of the historic Al Fahidi neighborhood, a labyrinthine enclave that was once a settlement for Persian merchants. They've long since left, their patched-up former homes now occupied by art galleries, courtyard cafés, and handicraft workshops.

Know where to look and you'll find that razzle-dazzle Dubai is surprisingly awash with these rootsy creative ingenuities. One day I followed a local friend's directions to Al Quoz, a dusty industrial estate adjacent to Jumeirah and Business Bay. Upon arrival, it looks like the part of town you'd hit up to get your car fixed: Mechanics' workshops and freight forwarders occupy windowless corrugated-steel hangars. But my first impression was soon proved wrong. The neighborhood's heart, Alserkal Avenue arts center, teemed with laptop-working, green-smoothie-drinking, yogamat-toting thirtysomethings. Starting with the arrival of Ayyam Gallery, ceramists, filmmakers, artists, and fashion designers have turned this former marble factory into Dubai's creative epicenter. One of its tenants is Butheina Kazim, who founded the Gulf's first arthouse theater, Cinema Akil, in 2014 as a way to bring Dubai's 200 different nationalities together through film.

Looking down the avenue, I spotted a giant LED sign on a rooftop that read "WHEN WILL YOU RETURN": an installation by NYC-based artist Mary Ellen Carroll. Before this visit, when the Dubai I envisioned was one of lavish overindulgence, I figured the city as one of those once-in-a-decade destinations – a fly-and-flop holiday spot for deeppocketed revelers. Now, I can't help but wonder what else from its past, present, and future awaits discovery. A hotel transfer by air, perhaps? Maybe I'll hop on an electric flying taxi – the emirate has already rolled out test flights.



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Palatial Playgrounds in the City of Gold

STAY With its stucco wind towers and palm-tufted gardens, beachfront Jumeirah Al Qasr feels like the grand palace of an erstwhile Arabian dynasty. Its 292 rooms, richly swathed in gold and cobalt, teeter on the right side of old-world opulence, while its facilities and tropical spa place the resort firmly in twenty-first-century Dubai. Doubles from \$528, including breakfast daily and one lunch or dinner and a 50-minute massage for two.

Sharing the same beach and many of the same facilities as Al Qasr, **Jumeirah Al Naseem** channels modern Dubai in 435 rooms with leather-trimmed furnishings and hammamlike bathrooms. Young guests will love the turtle-feeding sessions at the on-site rehabilitation lagoon. *Doubles from \$558, including breakfast daily and a 50-minute massage for two.*

With a plum position in the heart of downtown Dubai, the **Address Downtown**'s 220 rooms have stellar views of the Burj Khalifa – and its five-tiered pool delivers a welcome break from the desert heat. The massive spa sports a hammam, a Finnish sauna, and treatments such as medidiamond facials. *Doubles from* \$544, including breakfast daily and one lunch or dinner for two.

Presiding in a sprawling pyramid near the airport, **Raffles Dubai**'s 240 rooms are some of the Emirates' largest. Hieroglyph engravings in the lobby set the tone for a stay fit for a pharaoh, complete with a shisha garden and six bars and restaurants, ranging from Japanese to Italian. Doubles from \$274, including breakfast daily and a \$100 hotel credit.

When it opens this year, 44 of Atlantis The Royal Dubai's 795 rooms will come with private pools overlooking the Persian Gulf. Make a splash at rooftop lounge Cloud 22, with its nearly 300-foot-long infinity pool and nightclub. Rates to be announced and will include breakfast daily and a \$100 resort credit. 9

Offline in Luang Praboung

HE TRIP CAME AT THE RIGHT TIME. We all needed a break from work, school, and social schedules. And I was worried about how much time my sons (ages 12, 16, and 17) were spending glued to their myriad devices. I wanted them to understand what it felt like to travel untethered from phones and the internet, like my husband and I had during our days backpacking through Southeast Asia in the 1990s.





Luang Prabang, Laos' former royal capital, would give us the opportunity to slow down and connect with the residents and their culture. Upon arrival, I suggested we all go "off comms" during the day and leave our phones at the hotel. Cue the eye-rolling agony. I stood my ground.

"You won't miss them after a day," I promised. "Look around! There's so much to see." The Lao people joke that the abbreviation "PDR," as in People's Democratic Republic, really stands for "Please Don't Rush." Joy is found here in taking time to observe the minutiae of everyday life – a concept I knew my active sons might deem boring. On a boat trip along the Mekong River, we passed a group of monks constructing a new pontoon. They had stopped for a tea break. Our guide, Kharta, smiled when he saw them.


"They are putting into practice the Lao belief that too much work is bad for you," he told us. "There's a saying that the Vietnamese plant the rice, and the Lao listen to it grow."

"Doesn't that make Lao people sound a bit lazy?" Josh, my oldest, asked.

"Not at all," Kharta answered. "Doing nothing takes practice."

Kharta's words resonated the next day when we visited a sanctuary for Asian black bears and other wildlife rescued from illegal trade. We watched the bears nap in their hammocks, mesmerized by their stillness. I was thrilled to already notice a change in my sons, who had accepted that Snapchat streaks and Instagram Stories could wait. That morning, without me even making the request, they had left their phones behind at the hotel.

Simon's eyes panned the fields, searching for predators. When he was certain there were none, he nodded. "Yes, but stay near the Land Cruiser."


We hadn't planned to come to Kenya. In fact, we hadn't planned on going anywhere. Although we'd wanted to go to Africa for years, it had never worked out. But at one point last winter I turned to my husband, Larry, and said, "If not now, when?"


That afternoon, as we drove along in the heat, I thought of the first elephant we'd seen – a female who walked with her baby shielded between her legs. I recalled the lioness panting over the carcass of a buffalo. The hike we'd taken not far from our camp and the family of giraffes that grazed nearby. Our picnic lunch by the riverbank where hippos bathed. And the goat Simon had served the night before as Maasai men danced around the fire.

Now, in these waning hours of our trip, the elephant, huge and solitary, approached as we leaned against the Land Cruiser. He moved through the grass in his smooth, almost silent way. I want to move through the world that way, I told myself. It was like watching a living poem.

Safari means "journey" in Swahili, and this was ours. As the elephant receded into the trees, we got back into the Land Cruiser and drove away.

'D WANTED TO VISIT INDIA since I first saw a photo of the Taj Mahal in elementary school. But because of my muscular dystrophy and the 400-pound wheelchair I rely on, traveling there was impossible: The country's infrastructure is a challenge for visitors with disabilities. In 2018, I learned about India's first tour company equipped to handle accessible travel; a few months later, I was on my way for eight days of Golden Triangle adventure.

After more than 20 hours in transit, I arrived in Delhi. India was as magical as I expected, and more beautiful than I could've imagined. It was sensory overload in the best way, from the grandeur of the Taj Mahal to Jaipur's pink sandstone facades. There was a catch, though: Every time I rolled down the ramp and out of the van, dozens of people ran over to watch. They pointed at my wheelchair and took photos. After a few days, I started to get annoyed. I felt like a zoo animal, and I didn't understand why everyone was so mesmerized.

But on my fourth day, in Agra, an Indian man walked over to me with tears in his eyes. In broken English, he told me he'd never seen a motorized wheelchair like mine before. "My brother cannot get out of bed or leave the house because he needs a wheelchair," he said, "but we cannot afford it."

In that moment, I realized my privilege. I'm a wheelchair user, but I can leave my house. I can travel to the other side of the world. I've been to all seven continents, and that's only possible because I was born in a place where motorized assistance is the norm, and I have health insurance that pays for a wheelchair that costs as much as a luxury vehicle.

I smiled as the man walked away, knowing I'd never forget our exchange. Then I enjoyed the rest of my trip, stares and all, grateful for the adventure of a lifetime.

LMOST TEN YEARS AGO, on my flight from Lagos, I turned in response to an apology from the man next to me. He was traveling with his son, a toddler, who had just quieted after a long spell of crying. I told him it wasn't a problem. Then he asked me why I was headed to New York.

"For my master's," I said.

"That's nice. Have you ever been to New York?"

I told him no.

He looked at me as if shocked. "You have to be careful when you get to New York," he said. I searched his face for context. He seemed to want to say more, but just then his son woke up and began whimpering.

We began our final descent. The city appeared below, a mass of mottled shapes. With each pull downward I felt a rush of fear. It would be the first time I'd live in a foreign country, with no family nearby, and I had little more than \$1,000 in cash. I was already alarmed by my potential alienation, and the lack of irony in the man's voice made me even more anxious. After a little while, I couldn't bear it any longer.

"Can I ask, sir, what do you mean by what you said?"

"What I said?" the man replied, looking flustered.

I repeated the warning he'd given me.

"Oh. You are young. Don't worry. You'll be fine."

His words, though, had reached me at the time of heightened vulnerability during any big journey, that moment prior to arrival in a place I'd never been. As the plane trembled to a halt, I responded with a nervous chuckle and left it at that.

That day, I arrived to something unexpected: a man I'd never met in person, the editor of a magazine I wrote for, welcoming me with a sign bearing my name. I spent my first month living in his apartment, and over the next six years, New York became like a home, due in part to encounters with strangers and friends alike. It was a reminder that my expectations for a place should never be defined by others' assumptions.

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HEN MY 9-YEAR-OLD DAUGHTER and I traveled to Seattle from our home in Texas several years ago, we of course visited Pike Place Market and the Space Needle, but as a Native American, I wanted to introduce her to the region's Indigenous people. On a cloudless afternoon, with Mount Rainier on display in her glorious, snow-capped beauty, we ferried across Puget Sound to Blake Island, where a local attraction introduced visitors to some of the area's Native community – the island is an ancestral camping ground of the Suquamish Tribe.

Staff greeted us at the dock with bowls of steamed clams. Inside a cedar longhouse, murals painted in the iconic style of the Northwest Coast people covered the walls. We watched Native artists carve wood into miniature whale sculptures. Hunks of salmon sizzled over an open firepit, while a woman told an origin story that wove together elements from multiple Pacific Northwest tribes as men wearing dark, flowing robes and large, ornate black-and-red masks danced to her words across a stage.

After their performance, a Native man told us about the hours of practice he put into learning how to carry the heavy wooden mask while dancing. My daughter stared into the fierce, oversize eyes of the mask, now sitting beside us on a table. As he explained how Suquamish culture is passed between generations, I thought about how I struggled to pass my Indigenous culture to my daughter. We are Karuk and our ancestral territory is near Mount Shasta in California. Water, salmon, and storytelling are important to our tribe too.

When the dancer asked us what tribal nation we were from, my daughter's eyes widened. In Texas, strangers rarely acknowledge our Indigenous identity. To be a Native person often means feeling invisible, erased. But he saw her.

As we boarded the boat to return to Seattle, I thought about the way the man took action every day to keep his culture alive. It was our culture too. My daughter watched for the city's skyline to reappear. I knew she would remember this moment.



With cameras packed

my partner, Peter Frank Edwards, was looking forward to autumn's soft light across the Hudson River Valley. I was too, eager for sweater weather and the leaves' vivid display. Neither of us had spent much time exploring the valley in fall – just an overnight here or there on the way to getaways farther north in New England.

This time, we homed in on a mid- to upper section of the massive river that flows from its headwaters around Albany to New York Harbor, tracing a route through valley towns lined with historic brick buildings now home to galleries and cafés founded by NYC transplants. At its widest, the Hudson stretches some three miles across, its shores and valley dotted with lighthouses and redpainted barns; historic homes of Vanderbilts, Rockefellers, and Roosevelts turned museums; orchards and vineyards with stone fences; and farmers markets and roadside stands filled with all shapes and sizes of colorful gourds.

We planned the trip to catch the peak of fall colors: electric-orange maples, groves of deep-red apples, purple-black cabernet franc clusters at wineries such as Fjord Vineyards in Milton. It was remarkable how much the scenery still mirrored bucolic nineteenth-century Hudson River School paintings – especially so at Olana, the hilltop estate built by landscape artist Frederic Church just downriver from the town of Hudson.

Design and the arts have a strong presence in much of the valley, particularly

so in Hudson, a town of roughly 6,000 year-round residents that's home to shops such as ceramist Paula Greif's workshop, apothecary The Quiet Botanist, and Finch Hudson, where owners Andrew Arrick and Michael Hofemann showcase vintage and modern furniture and home goods. A few doors down, fashion designer Mary Vaughn Williams traded more than two dozen years in the NYC industry for her weathered-brick and wood-floored store, Hudson Clothier, which sources wardrobe staples from across the U.S. in an ode to Americana.

It's a theme that carries through to our base, Troutbeck, which has welcomed valley visitors for centuries in the town of Amenia. The stone manor house's parlors are filled with books and curios, among them a framed 1939 letter from a curator at London's Royal Botanic Gardens about the extraordinary collection of clematis vines in Troutbeck's walled garden. The 250acre estate serves as an idyllic gateway to cycling, fly-fishing, hiking, and winetasting in the surrounding hills, with a rustic cider from nearby Graft cidery and seasonal dishes such as a salad with local beets, husk cherries, and hazelnuts waiting upon your return.

My favorite moment of the trip, though, was at Philip Orchards in Claverack. After Peter Frank climbed an orchard ladder for a photo, he plucked a crimson apple from a branch for us to share. Months later, I still remember crunching into the Empire apple in the sunshine, tasting Hudson Valley's fall color and sweetness in each bite.





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

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Navigating a Oludson River Getaway

Daily rides focus on low-traffic, scenic routes through covered bridges, with rest breaks for farm visits and tastings of artisanal cheeses and local wines, as well as whiskey at a boutique distillery. *Departures: Multiple dates, May through October, 2023; from \$3,995.*

Active travel company **Backroads** leads five-day cycling trips that spin along the Hudson River Valley and into the Catskill Mountains, with stops at limestone Hyde Park mansions and elsewhere on the riverside Millionaires' Row. *Departures: Multiple dates, September 5 through October 16, 2023; from \$3,499.*

Wings Air Helicopters offers private, bird's-eye views of the valley that include a vineyard tour and tasting with a multicourse lunch at Torne Valley or Milea vineyards, round-trip from Manhattan. Departures: Any day through 2022; from \$5,525 for two or \$11,000 for up to five passengers. ♥

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
